Hello All. As a parent I frequently correct my kids. I try to get them to use the backboard when doing layups in basketball. I tell them what good manners

consist of. I show them why they got a problem wrong in math. Providing correction is one of the main responsibilities of parenting. My attempts to show my children the right way to do things are not always successful, but I must keep on trying. The attempts I make to help them be the best people they can be are a result of the love I have for them. At the same time if I am constantly correcting their every misstep they are going to feel frustrated, not loved.

A challenge for me is determining when I should correct my kids and when I should let it go. Sometimes they do things that are clearly wrong that don't actually need to be corrected. During the past year we have:

- Partnered with the International Institute of New England (IINE) and the UCC churches in Georgetown and Byfield to host an informative event on the refugee crisis.
- Revived the Bookworm Café an annual event featuring guest appearances from local authors, used books for sale and homecooked food.
- Hosted a Community Café on the last Wednesday of each month, partnering with Burwell Beans gourmet coffee roasters.
- Sponsored our second annual "Pop-the-Trunk" food drive to support Lazarus House Ministries in collaboration with three area churches and a number of community organizations.
- We also collected food donations for Rowley Food Pantry.
- Collected used clothing and new undergarments and sanitary supplies for Triton middle- and high schools. This is done with support of our church members and also in partnership with the Fellowship Thrift Shop.

- Sponsored 10 children and teens in the local DCF system for the local holiday Giving Tree.
- Collected warm hats, mittens, scarves and coats for Lazarus House ministries.
- monthly"Missions Sponsored Walks" gentle strolls nature where we can commune with nature and with each other.
- Hosted 4 summer "Movie Nights" inviting the congregation and the community to watch a movie and eat ice cream.
- This year we will likely be continuing many of the same activities.



A website is also a great way to reach out to anyone looking for a place to worship. It is where new visitors are introduced to the church. Knowing that the vast majority of people who discover a church will discover it online, it is important to recognize that first impressions matter. How people perceive a church's website is how many will perceive the entire church as a whole. Take a quick minute to search for churches in our area and check out their websites. What impressions did you have before you even read a word? You probably made assumptions about which churches are more established or relevant to you simply based on how their sites look and feel.

When designing the new website for the church, I wanted it look modern and be easy to navigate. It was also important to have it to look good whether seen on a computer, phone, or any other device. This was accomplished using a technique called "Responsive Web Design". This technique is a design approach to make web pages render well on all screen sizes and resolutions while ensuring good usability. The new church website accomplishes this goal.

The best church websites make information easy to find without overloading a visitor with too much too soon. It is all about having a nice clean look and easy to use menus. Our website organizes information in logical groupings.

We have pages about the church including Worship Time, Contact Information, Statement Of Faith, Vision Statement, Church History, Sunday School, and Christian Education. There are also pages that describe all of the Church Committees. We even have a page titled "Getting To Know Us".

There are pages to help the community get involved. Upcoming Events are listed on the home page. There are individual pages for all church events including the Community Cafe, Community Dinners

Pancake Breakfasts, Rowley Prays, and Mission Walks. The Church Calendar is also available to view.

Every church needs to reach out for financial support. Weekly donations are wonderful and greatly appreciated but they do not cover all of the church's expenses. The website has pages for fund raising events like the Ezekiel Rogers Golf Tournament. There is a page for making donations for those who wish to contribute online. We also have a page that features the Fellowship Thrift Shop, which is a great revenue source for the church.

The church website also provides valuable information. The Steeple Notes newsletter gets published every month. We also have a great Blog that gets updated regularly.

The website was designed to connect the congregation and it belongs to all of us. Hopefully you will visit the website often and explore all of the ministries and events happening.

Meet Ian and Lauren Patrick



A Message From the Moderator

During the course of the church's calendar year, six scheduled meetings occur that involve the church body:

- The Annual Meeting (April)
- The Semi-Annual Meeting (November)
- Quarterly Cabinet Meetings (March, June, September, and December)



Our bylaws require that the agenda for the Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings be posted at least two weeks prior to the meeting. Included on the agenda is a bullet: "Any other business that needs to come before the congregation." This allows for topics to be included that have been raised by a parishioner and/or a board or committee since the agenda was published. At times, a vote may be required depending on the topic submitted.

Our bylaws require that the agenda for the Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings be posted at least two weeks prior to the meeting. Included on the agenda is a bullet: "Any other business

that needs to come before the congregation." This allows for topics to be included that have been raised by a parishioner and/or a board or committee since the



agenda was published. At times, a vote may be required depending on the topic submitted. I am respectfully requesting that all agenda items for the Annual or Semi-Annual Meeting be submitted to me and/or to the Clerk (David Irving) prior to the meeting and that a brief explanation about the background of the topic be provided. This process will help us avoid asking individuals to cast a vote when they do not feel fully informed of the subject matter.

A Message From the Moderator, cont...

Should you be in any congregational meeting and asked to vote on a subject on which you feel you do not have sufficient information to cast a vote, you may make a motion to "table" the vote.

This motion needs to be seconded by someone and voted. If there is a majority vote to "table" the motion, then the discussion is no longer debated, and it is tabled until an agreed upon time. If, however, the vote to "table" does not pass, then the original motion is voted on.

From Robert's Rules: Parliamentary Procedures at Meeting: http://www.rulesonline.com "To table a discussion is to lay aside the business at hand in such a manner that it will be considered later in the meeting or at another time("I make a motion to table this discussion until the next meeting. In the meantime, we will get more information so we can better discuss the issue.")

I hope this revised process for setting the agenda and providing background information that leads to an informed vote, is both helpful and leads to a more informed and inclusive process.
