

WHY DO WE NEED A PASTOR TO HAVE COMMUNION

In the United Church of Christ, the Lord's Supper (or Communion) is one of two sacraments, which are signs and seals of God's saving grace. The other one is Baptism. Both are sacred rites that require a leader who's either ordained or licensed in the UCC or in a "full communion" partner denomination.

But why? Why do we need someone who holds a particular status in the church? Aren't all Christians equal before God? Then why can't somebody from the diaconate, choir or board of trustees celebrate the ritual at the Communion Table?

To be clear, it's not about magic powers. One time in another congregation, one of my parishioners referred to Baptism as "hocus pocus." She was mistaken, perhaps confused by what it means to consecrate something. There is no hocus pocus going on either at the baptismal font or at the Communion table.

What we're doing instead is consecrating, or setting apart, ordinary elements for sacred purposes. After that, they will never be returned to ordinary or "profane" use. Any unconsumed Communion bread is fed to the birds. Unconsumed juice is poured prayerfully into the earth. Such practices are observed by churches around the world.

A major reason for sanctioned leaders to be involved in sacraments is so that the elements are administered with integrity and pastoral sensitivity to build up the community of Jesus' followers.

But let's dig further. What exactly does an ordained or licensed minister bring to the administration of the sacrament? Is it about pronouncing Biblical words properly... or moving hands and wrists in a special way at the Communion Table... or saying silent prayers that make it all legit in the eyes of God?

Alas, no. It's not about that. It's about making meaningful decisions that impact how powerful symbols are managed, how the faithful are taught to share in the sacramental life and how the elements are shared. It's about framing experiences so that the Savior Jesus Christ is perceived, received and lifted up as Lord of our lives.

The work of administering sacraments involves many judgement calls. What's needed to prepare for baptism? Who can receive Communion? Is it OK to take extra sacrament for a tough week ahead? Which drink should be used to represent the blood of Jesus? Is it ever OK to baptize in the backyard? And so forth.

With each decision comes an opportunity to open hearts and minds to what's represented in the sacrament. Pastors are trained to read the ever-changing social landscape and use the sacraments creatively, faithfully and purposefully while honoring the parameters that define sacred rituals.

If handling the sacraments were simply a matter of reading and waiving hands over water, food and drink, then we would not need an authorized minister to do it. Likewise, if it involved no meaningful decision-making, just following tradition and heeding instructions, then once again an authorized minister would be unneeded.

But the sacraments are powerful agents of encounter with the holy. By calling ordained and licensed people to serve as pastors, congregations empower them to make dynamic decisions that impact who has such encounters, how they happen and under what conditions. Our hope is that scores of lives will be changed for the better as a function of pastoral decisions shaping our sacramental life.
