#### **HOW HYMNS GET CHOSEN**

At First Church of Rowley, music planning helps us make a joyful noise to the Lord!

That's why the Music Committee worked hard over several weeks this year to develop guidelines for hymn selection (see next page). In these guidelines, we have criteria for picking hymns that facilitate faithful singing.

This set of coherent, amendable guidelines is essential. Without it, we'd be at the mercy of the pastor's guesswork and/or divergent requests from individuals. That would lead to perpetual frustration and never-ending uncertainty about how decisions are made.


We're not stuck. We have a system, and if it's not getting the results we seek, then all we have to do is tweak the guidelines. That gives the pastor and musician the direction they need.

These guidelines come from the congregation. All I did in creating them was to distill themes that were expressed in committee members' written input.

If you're interested in music at First Church, please have a look at the guidelines so that you know how hymns are chosen.

If you believe our hymn selection could benefit from new approaches, please reach out to the Music Committee (Nicola Pyburn and Richard Jesionowski) to propose changes to the guidelines. Tell them specifically what you'd like to see added or subtracted. They will take your input under consideration. That's the right way to pursue the results you seek. If the Committee adopts new coherent guidelines, I will bring them to bear when selecting hymns. Otherwise, I'll keep working with the ones I have, and we'll keep making a joyful noise together.

## GUIDELINES FOR SELECTING HYMNS AT FCCR

Approved by Music Committee, January 2025

A. The music we sing together is meant to:

- · praise God
- enable everyone to participate
- elicit positive and authentic feelings
- help parishioners receive the word of God
- reinforce themes in the worship service
- foster appreciation for a variety of styles from classic to contemporary

#### B. We value opportunities to sing:

- Familiar classics from our 2 hymn books
- Songs that are new to us as long as they're relatively simple, easy to learn and easy to sing the first time
- Songs played with upbeat tempos & uplifting effects
- Songs with messages relevant to scripture, themes in the service, ordinary people's lives and today's world
- In a variety of musical styles and types

#### C. When we have a keyboardist, we aim to sing:

- Selections from our two hymnals: The Pilgrim and The New Century
- A mix of familiar chestnuts and new songs that are worth trying because they meet criteria noted above
- Energetic, except when the day's themes call for a different spirit

#### D. When we sing along with YouTube videos, we strive to choose songs that:

- Are no more than 3 minutes long
- Are easy to follow with large, easy to read lyrics
- Are visual and feel / look modern
- Foster appreciation for types of music we don't find in our hymnals, such as contemporary styles and music from other Christian cultures
- Can be taught so that everyone can get comfortable singing them

#### E. We try not to select music that:

- Is unknown, obscure, rhythmically complex or hard to follow
- Is set in a minor key, unless it's familiar or sung only occasionally
- Sounds like a dirge, unless it's appropriate for a solemn day


